Public Health at a Glance

Public Health, in one word, is Prevention. Prevention is so important to what we do, we put it in our new logo. We invest all our public dollars and efforts into prevention because we recognize the high return on investment. But prevention cannot stand alone. We work collaboratively with the entire health care system in Madison County to prevent disease and encourage healthy lifestyles. Everything we do is meant to improve community health and see our residents live well and live longer.

During the summer of 2017 we convened more than fifteen community organizations to build on the Community Health Assessment that was completed in 2016. The result was a comprehensive Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) with three task forces set to focus on: 1) Substance Abuse, 2) Infant Morbidity and Mortality, and 3) Healthy Lifestyles. The CHIP is our community blueprint to positively impact some of the most pressing health issues in Madison County.

On August 5, 2017 MCPH joined forces with the Ohio National Guard to provide a day of free health care for everyone in Madison County. More than 100 medical professionals from Madison County Public Health, the Ohio National Guard, and Madison Health provided health services to 248 residents. Residents received free blood work, physicals, developmental assessments, mammograms, STD and HIV testing, vaccinations, vision and hearing exams, dental sealants, and fluoride varnish. This event was such a great success that we had people calling our office the next week asking when we would do this again!

Please keep our 5 Core Commitments in mind: Deliver excellent customer service, respect & care about people, create positive change, be fiscally responsible, and do the right thing. We hope that these commitments shine through with every interaction you have with us. If you see an area where we can improve, let us know about it – we want to improve because you are the reason we are here.

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

WIC helps to improve overall health during the most critical growth and developmental years in a child's life- conception to age 5.

WIC is a nutrition education program, serving income eligible pregnant, postpartum and breastfeeding women, infants and children up to 5 years of age with a health or nutrition risk.

WIC core services include:






Nursing Services

Immunizations, School Health, Children with Medical Handicaps (CMH)



- 7573 children received vision and hearing screenings
- 2334 immunizations were given to children and adults
- 1,246 children received scoliosis and blood pressure screenings
- 500 senior visits and/or contacts were made
- 241 children and their families were served through the CMH Program
- 213 TB test were administered







The office of Vital Statistics can issue birth certificates for the entire state of Ohio, as well as death certificates for deaths that occurred in Madison County. The \$23.00 certificate fee breakdown is below.

Highlights

Planning
